when we delight in the law of God and drink of the living water, we are like those trees that never experience the falling leaves (*Psalms 1:1-3*).

When thinking about falling leaves in this life, we know that the leaves will fall and there is no putting them back on trees. Falling leaves serve to remind us that we should live faithfully in God's service because, like the leaves, our time on earth is limited (James 4:13-17). You may remember the song by Grandpa Jones called "Falling Leaves."

Falling leaves that lie scattered on the ground The birds and flowers that were here cannot be found All the friends that he once had are not around They're all scattered like the leaves upon the ground

Some folks drift along through life and never thrill, To the feeling that a good deed brings until, It's too late and they are ready to lie down, There beneath the leaves that's scattered on the ground.



Isn't it wonderful to know that in heaven the faithful will not be concerned with raking and bagging falling leaves (Revelation 22:1-4). And even more joyous, no more back pain! (Revelation 21:4).

Falling Leaves

He shall be like a tree planted by the rivers of water, That brings forth its fruit in its season, Whose leaf also shall not wither, And whatever he does shall prosper. Psalms 1:3



A little 6 year old boy and his 4 year old sister were out in the backyard and Momma noticed that they were very quiet. As any Mom knows, quiet kids sound a loud signal that something might be amiss. However, to her surprise,

they were just very, very busy kids. They were collecting fallen leaves from a big maple and very carefully stacking them up in piles as neatly as they could. Mom thought this was a good moment to show the kids her appreciation for their hard labor, so she grabbed an extra large plastic leaf bag and started to gather the stacks of leaves the kids had collected. But as soon as she shoved the first pile in the bag, her son yelled, "No Mommy please don't hurt the leaves!" This was another surprise, so she asked, "What do you mean?" Her son sternly replied, "Mommy we are going to have Daddy put all these leaves back on the tree when he gets home!"

The trees are beautiful when they turn color, but when the leaves hit the ground their beauty turns to work. Without question, the falling leaves are not going to go back on the trees. They are going to lie on the ground or blow over to the neighbor's yard, unless we take the time to render them invisible.



When we look at the scripture, Ezekiel prophesied about a city for the children of God. Ezekiel writes, "the name of the city from that day shall be: THE LORD IS THERE" (Ezekiel 48:35). Ezekiel tells of a time that water flowing from the temple of God would provide water for trees that would never lose their leaves. "Along the bank of the river, on this side and that, will grow all kinds of trees used for food; their leaves will not wither, and their fruit will not fail. They will bear fruit every month, because their water flows from the sanctuary. Their fruit will be for food, and their leaves for medicine" (Ezekiel 47:12). Jesus told the Samaritan woman at Jacob's well about this living water from God, "but whoever drinks of the water that I shall give him will never thirst. But the water that I shall give him will become in him a fountain of water springing up into everlasting life" (John 4:14). Wouldn't it be wonderful to have a yard full of trees that never lost their leaves. No more raking, bagging and aching backs. Spiritually speaking,


