Veterans Who Pray

There was a certain man in Caesarea called Cornelius, a centurion of what was called the Italian Regiment, a devout man and one who feared God with all his household, who gave alms generously to the people, and prayed to God always. (Acts 10:1-2)



Growing up with younger brothers and four close neighbor boys, playing “Army” was a daily summer adventure. We would build fortified bunkers and use dirt clods and hedge apples for mortars. For grenades, we tossed overripe apples and rotten tomatoes. I remember how proud I was when I got my first surplus army helmet. It was really just a liner, but that didn’t matter. Not only did I look like a real soldier, but I had fewer headaches. When I obtained my first Daisy BB gun, I was really excited because the BB’s were a strong deterrent against the older neighbor boys.

Looking back, I suppose it is a wonder, that none of us that grew up on the end of High Street, were ever seriously wounded or killed in action! In addition to playing “Army,” I would delight in the chance to share a war movie with my Dad. Though he was a navy veteran, he did like Army movies. Unlike movies today, in the “old movies” you could see soldiers who would take the time to pray. Even as a kid I could understand the need for a soldier’s prayer, especially when the mortars and grenades were real and the bullets bigger than BBs!

When we look back at Cornelius as a centurion in the Italian Regiment, we read that he prayed to God always. A centurion in the Roman Army was the chief or captain of 100 men. The Italian Regiment, stationed at Caesarea, consisted of Italian soldiers, not the natives of the country like many other Roman troops in Syria and throughout the Roman empire. The centurions were men who had been on the front lines as soldiers, facing the heat of the battles. They were men who marched into the face of death and fought hand to hand, sword to sword. The centurions were soldiers who had proven themselves worthy by being veterans of Roman service. What is extremely noteworthy about this soldier is that Cornelius feared God. The Italian Romans would have been in the heart of Greek mythology and Roman idolatry. And of great significance is that scripture says this soldier prayed to God always. In a vision, this fighting veteran was told by an angel, “Your prayers and your alms have come up for a memorial before God” (Acts 10:4). And then this centurion is instructed,


