

hearing of the people” Exodus 24:7. In the law of Moses, it is amazing to read of the number of sacrifices that were required of God’s people and the amount of time sacrificed to prepare all the offerings. In Hebrews, we have a reflection of the time of sacrifice that was required under the law: “And every priest stands ministering daily and offering the same sacrifices, which can never take away sins” (Hebrews 10:11). Fortunately for Christians, Christ put an end to the sacrifices and the time required under the law of Moses by offering himself “once and for all” (Hebrews 10:10).

Isn’t it wonderful that because of Christ taking the time to sacrifice himself, we no longer have to take the time to sacrifice the physical sacrifices of the OT Law? Now we are able to take the time to offer spiritual sacrifices like the sacrifice of praise (Hebrews 13:15). Therefore, it is important that we stop our clocks and make the necessary time for spiritual sacrifices. We need to make sure we are not too busy to give our Lord the sacrifice of time required to study the Bible, pray, serve, and attend classes and worship assemblies. We must strive to never be too busy to stop the clock and make time for spiritual sacrifices! (Romans 12:1-2)

Did you know that the easiest way to stop a modern clock is to pull the battery out? You may need a hammer for the wind up clock! Cell phone clock: Off button?

Time for Sacrifices

Therefore by Him let us continually offer the sacrifice of praise to God, that is, the fruit of our lips, giving thanks to His name. Hebrews 13:15

Here it is already, 2019! The clock of life seems to spin faster and faster and it is not easy to stop it. But it is easy to catch myself saying, “If I have time I will get this or that done today.” And as you might suspect, not enough hours in the day. If I really want to get something done, it seems I have to stop the racing of the clock and make an appointment with myself and say, “This you must do no matter what!!” The scenario of finding time is a common problem for a lot of people; the hands on the clock just keep going round and round.



In Genesis 4:3-4, we read of two men who had to take time for sacrifice to God. We read, “*And in the process of time it came to pass that Cain brought an offering of the fruit of the ground to the Lord. Abel also brought of the firstborn of his flock and of their fat.*” When you think about the process of time required for the fruit to be produced from the ground, harvested and then brought for sacrifice, it is clear that sacrifice requires time. The same for the firstborn of the flock. It took time for the animal to grow and be prepared for the sacrifice. When Noah exited the Ark, Genesis 8:20 tells us, “*Then Noah built an altar to the Lord, and took of every clean animal and of every clean bird, and offered burnt offerings on the altar.*” Can you imagine the amount of time for sacrifice that it took Noah to build the altar and prepare the sacrifice? Was it important? Notice God’s response to this time of sacrifice: “*And the Lord smelled a soothing aroma*” Genesis 8:21.

At Mt. Sinai, we read that Moses made time for sacrifice. “*Moses wrote all the words of the Lord, and he rose early in the morning, and built an altar at the foot of the mountain, and twelve pillars, according to the twelve tribes of Israel. Then he sent young men of the children of Israel, who offered burnt offerings, and sacrificed peace offerings of oxen to the Lord*” Exodus 24:4-5. And then he sacrificed time to take “*the book of the covenant, and read in the*
